With further reference to your letter of the 1/6/17 and to mine of the 2/8/17: I am sorry to tell you that there has been little information forthcoming ~~with~~ regarding your son's death. Captain T. Nangle (Chaplain) states that he knows nothing himself, nor can he find out particulars. The Officer Commanding 1st Battalion, Newfoundland Regiment in the Field, caused enquiries to be made from the men who would be most likely to know, but the only information he gained was to the effect that Private Cron was last seen entering the village of Monchy on the day of the attack with the rest of the Battalion. No one could say what became of him after that.

I personally questioned Lieut. J.G. Bemister, who was an Officer of your son's Company. Lieut. Bemister remembers seeing Private Cron in the trenches before the attack, but he cannot recollect seeing him after.

I greatly regret that the result of my enquiries have been so fruitless, but it is feared that, on the day your son died, many other gallant Newfoundland soldiers fell, particulars of whose glorious death may never come to light.

Dear Sir,

Your letter of the 16th inst to my wife duly  
rec'd. She desires me to reply.

It does not seem very clear to us (and we would like to  
be satisfied on this question) whether our boy's body was  
found or not? and we reason it out this way. Surely some  
one must have reported his death, for we were notified on  
the publication of the Casualty Lists after the Monchy  
attack that he was missing, and 24 hours after notified he  
was killed in action. Some one must have seen some proof  
that he was killed for the authorities to transfer his name  
from the Missing to the Killed in Action list.

We do not want to be troublesome but you must know it  
is only natural for us to wish to have our mind set at rest  
on this point.

Quoting your letter, "No one could say what became of  
him after that" that is, after entering the village of Monchy.  
If that is so we are led to think you are not certain whether  
he was killed or not.

We received this morning through the Dept. of Militia,  
St. John's, a pckge sent from the P.&R. Office, London, which  
contained a picture post card and his birth certificate, also  
a letter sent him by his mother. These were all much soiled  
and worn, as if they had been carried about in the pocket for  
a long time. Can you find out, and let us know whether these  
were taken from off his body or were they left amongst his  
effects at the base or elsewhere, picked up and sent on.

It would be a satisfaction to us if we could only find  
out how he died? if his body was found? if he got Christian  
burial? You see he was very dear to us. He was very young  
and we could (over)

at least have kept him back for eighteen months, had  
we tried, and so are apt to blame ourselves..

With reference to your letter 11/9/17 (5548): I beg to state that the O.C., 1st Bn., B.E.F., France wrote as follows on 25/10/17, in answer to an enquiry sent by me as the result of a letter received from James Cron, of Harbor Grace 31/8/17:

"No. 2489 J. Mahon states that Pte. Cron was wounded on Ap. 14 and that while making his way back 2 shells pitched quite close to him and he disappeared. I do not know through what channel his papers were forwarded, but you might ask the Graves Registration if they have any trace of his grave.

With reference to your letter 31/8/17 asking for further particulars regarding the death of your son: the matter was again referred to the Base and by the authorities there to Colonel Hadow, Officer Commanding 1st Battalion, who has made the following reply to the enquiries:

"It is regretted that no further information can be obtained now owing to the large number of casualties which have happened since.

It may be taken for granted that the pay book and papers which were sent in were taken from his body.

Owing to the heavy fighting which was going on at the time it is impossible to say if he was buried. The Graves Registration Dept. would doubtless be able to inform you."

I also wrote to the Director of Graves Registration & Enquiries and was informed that no report had been received concerning Pte. Cron's grave.

I greatly regret that it has not been possible to obtain further details, but of course you will understand that this office can only pass on information which it is able to obtain from those actually on the scene.

Dear Sir: -

Several people have been to me seeking information about the estates of boys who have been killed in action in France, I could give them no satisfactory answer to their questions and I hardly know how to place the matter before you in such a way that you may give me the information sought.

The best way will be to state a case, so let me state my own, which will pretty well cover the others, as their cases are very much the same as mine.

My son No 1585 Pte J. J. J. enlisted in June 1915, was sent across the foley mouth in the S.S. Calgarau after training in the old country, was sent to France early in 1916, was wounded at Beaumont Hamel, sent to Waudsworth, discharged from Hospital to the depot at Ayr to convalesce in Feb 1917 he returned to France and was killed in action at Morechy on the 14th April 1917. That is the history.

We have tried from every source we could think of to ~~try and~~ get further information about the lad but of course he was killed.

by a comrade to have been wounded and trying to get back to the lines, when a couple of shells came and pitched near by, he did not see Jim afterwards."

We have had none of his belongings sent home excepting a few soiled Post Cards or letters, there was no information as to where these were found, and we can only presume they were taken from some pocket or pockets of his old clothes that he left behind either at the base, or in the trenches before he went over the top, they could not have been taken from his body as the authorities have no information to give us as to his body, where buried, so again we have to presume it was never found and identified, don't you think they might have told where they got those mementos that were sent us. (Post Cards & Letters soiled) we have had to presume a lot in his case I can assure you.

Now we come to what the people are seeking to know. Every soldier has an account opened with the pay office, and anything he may leave behind goes to those he named at his enlistment, it is true his mother has received regularly his allotment money, but now the war is on,

we know the allotment money will  
not be paid very much longer, but  
there is the balance of his pay the  
diff. since he was killed, in his case  
50 a day. or any balance that may  
have been in his favor when he was killed.  
So the question is

Do the relatives of the deceased  
soldiers get the bal: of pay that may  
be due them?

Is there any compensation allowed  
the next of kin of a deceased soldier?

Is the allotment they are drawing  
now all the relatives may expect?

I will be greatly obliged and  
those others who are asking thro me  
if you will put us right on the  
above
