

To Sir Joseph Outerbridge,

Dear Sir,

Your letter of July 30th reached me to-day and I am very sorry to hear that your son Lieut. Norman Outerbridge is reported wounded and missing since our attack on April 14th. Your son was in charge of No. 15 Platoon, "D" Co. and I was in charge of No. 14 Platoon, hence was in a position to see some of the morning's doings. My platoon went over the top in the first wave, we being the left of our battalion. Your son's platoon was in the second wave which would be about 30 or 40 yards behind mine. After we had advanced close on 300 yards our ranks had become considerably thinned. All our officers had been knocked out with the exception of Mr. Norman, and he was wounded in the leg, he however did not flinch, but with the pluck and bravery becoming an English Officer he rallied the remainder of good old "D" Company and limping, he gallantly led us on our way. After progressing another 100 or 150 yds we received the full force of the enemy's machine gun fire, and were forced to take cover. On again rising and moving forward your heroic son was not with us and I concluded that his wound had become too much for him and that he had rested, however I did not see any more of him, and on being captured some time afterward. I made enquiries of the men belonging to "D" Coy., but they could give no other information. Your son's actions on that memorable morning will forever remain in the minds of those who were with him as his courage and perseverance inspired us all in the face of great odds, but our little band (we numbered scarcely ...) were eventually surrounded by the enemy and forced to surrender. During the day the Germans brought in many of our wounded and perhaps Lieut Norman may be amongst the number. I trust such is the case and that you have heard better news ere now. There were .... of the Nfld Regt. captured unwounded. They are now distributed in various working camps and whilst at first conditions were not of the best they have vastly improved and we are becoming comfortable. In this camp with me are two other Nflds, No. 523 Pte Smythe and 2214 Pte Hudson. They work each day and are quite well. Sergts. and Corpls. do not work but are in charge of parties. I am in charge of 50 men who work at an electric plant and whilst the work is interesting it also helps to pass the time away. We are looking forward to receiving our parcels and we would be much obliged if the good people at home would send along some magazines or papers printed before the war. We are allowed to write two letters monthly and a postcard each week, so in case our people at home do not get news often they can understand matters.

Trusting you have received better news and hoping all our people at home are well and know of our whereabouts,



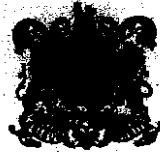

My dear Timewell

I received from you last night,  
forwarded from Ayr, a pair of  
binoculars and a compass.

They were addressed to my brother,  
(H.O), but I suppose were intended  
for me, as he did not put in  
for any binoculars.

I am returning them both to you  
by parcel post and hope you  
will not think me a great  
crank.

The glasses are exceedingly good ones but do not appear to me to be in first class order.

The prisms of the left optic are spotted and in damp weather I imagine that sort of thing is likely to spread. It is most easily noticed by looking through the wrong end, holding the glasses about 6 inches from the eye. It seems possible that the same fault may have been detected before as I notice the screw heads on that side are all damaged. There is also a small chip out of each

of the small glasses in the eye-pieces but that does not appear to matter.

The compass also is out of gear in that the shutting of the cover does not lock the mechanism as intended. This seems to me rather an important point.

What I wanted was a prism compass, but had to get one like the one you sent in Edinburgh last week. However if this had been all right I should have kept it, as I don't suppose it is very expensive and an extra one might come in handy. I hate to bother you in this

as good as these but without  
their faults? - or could I  
get as good a pair myself  
direct without troubling you?


