This man developed Pleurisy - left side - ~~and~~ in April, after running a course and being convalescent, he contracted Pleurisy on the right side. There is now evidence of Tuberculosis, in the lung, and I would recommend that he be sent to Jansen Camp for treatment.



NOTES REGARDING EDWARD QUINTON.

Edward Quinton, Southern Bay, Bonavista Bay, aged 19; admitted Jensen Camp June 13th, died June 27th.

This man boarded with Mrs. Pippy, 42 Young Street. He came with her on the 9th of March. He left her place for the Camp on the 13th of June. This man got sick April 6th; came home wet from duty all night at the wharf when contingent left to go away. After this he was sent home April 9th on leave; returned April 19th still sick. Reported Headquarters on the 20th April. Was put on outside guard at five o'clock that evening; stayed on duty for twenty-four hours. That night, Saturday, April 21st, he was taken bad. Sunday morning reported sick to Headquarters, being unable to go on Sunday's parade. Asked for doctor. The regimental doctor visited him on Monday, April 23rd, at five o'clock, attended him at Mrs. Pippy's house up to the 13th of June, when he was sent to Jensen Camp.

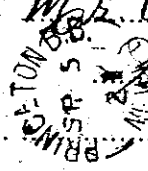

Dear Reverend Sir,

I beg to inform you that this Department has received the consent of the father of the above named soldier to treat his grave as a War Grave. With this end in view this Department is anxious to have the work completed before the frost arrives and, if possible, we would prefer to have the work done by a local man from Southern Bay, if one can be found who has a thorough knowledge of concrete work.

I am enclosing a circular letter which may be of use to the contractor and will give the dimensions of the curb. If needed we will ship the cement and lumber from here.

I may say that the headstone has not yet arrived but provision will be left in the head of the curb to set the stone as soon as it arrives.

The above named soldier is buried in the C. of E. cemetery at Southern Bay, B.B. and it would be appreciated if you could appoint someone to do this work, and certify the bills, for which payment will be made on presentation.
