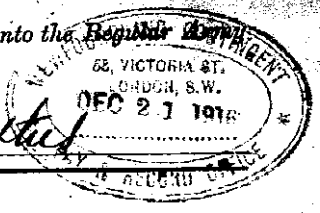

It was with the greatest regret that the Government received a cablegram from the Record Office, London, intimating that your brave boy, No. 2195, Private Augustus Quinton, had died of wounds at the King George Hospital in London on the 19th November.

Permit me to express to you on behalf of the Government, as well as for myself, sincerest sympathy at this time. But though we feel the parting and though the heart is heavy with its loss, yet it is a glorious thing to think that your gallant boy early responded to the call of duty and made his stand for the establishment of Righteousness, Truth and Liberty upon the earth. We are all proud of our brave and noble boys but no less do we esteem the unselfish fathers and mothers who so willingly gave their boys when the call of duty came. Though your boy has laid down his earthly weapons he wears the Soldier's Crown of Victory and his name is inscribed upon the glorious Roll of Honour and will be held in fragrant memory by all his fellowcountrymen. When the end of this war comes and an honourable and abiding Peace will have been established, it will be your proud thought that your dear boy did to the utmost of his ability to bring about such result.

I trust that the Great Father may give you of his love and comfort at this time.

Pte. Augustus Quinton, No. 2195, 1st Newfoundland Regt. was
from the King George Hospital, London, at 5 o'clock, November 22nd,
with all Military Honours. The young lad died at 2 a.m. November
19th, succumbing to fatal wounds received in action September 9th.
At 1.30 the casket was tenderly borne out of the Hospital doors upon
the shoulders of six men of the 2nd Post Office Rifles, and placed upon
the hearse. Interment was at Wandsworth Cemetery. The casket was a
handsome dark oak, and was draped with the glory crowned flag of the
Newfoundland Regiment. The following words were neatly inscribed on
the plate:

2195, Pte Augustus Quinton,

1st Newfoundland Regiment,

Died November 19, 1916. Aged 19 Years.

A beautiful laurel and lily chaplet from Mrs. Bryson and a lovely
wreath of chrysanthemums, with a cluster of ferns and white lilies
from Mrs. Fisher were prominent among the flowers, also a large chaplet
of laurel leaves, and red roses from the Newfoundland Association, and
a particularly handsome wreath of lilies and roses, from the British
Red Cross Society. Pte. T. Hussey attended the funeral, representing
the Pay & Record Office, and Mesdames Bryson and Fisher representing
the Association. As the sad procession wended its way through the
crowded London streets, people of all classes and creeds paid their
respects to the young Colonial soldier, by raising a hat or inclining
a head. Soldiers stood smartly to attention and gave the dead a
salute of respect and honour. The pall bearers and 'Guard of Honour'
walked with reversed arms. A bright November sun was shining as the
procession passed through the big gates of Wandsworth Cemetery, and
quite a number gathered together in the little chapel to take part in
the prayers for the dead. From the little Churchyard Chapel the coffin
was carried to the graveside, around which by now a number of sympa-
thetic people had gathered. A deep silence, impressive and beautiful,
prevailed, which was broken only by the deep tones of the minister as
he read the graveside prayer. All hearts were sad, and went out in
great sympathy to those parents in far away Newfoundland, mourning the
the loss of their young heroic son. Many an eye was dimmed and many
a heart was moved as the remains were gently lowered into the care of

Earth to await the great awakening. Three volleys were fired
the open grave, and the last sound of the rifle fire was lost
in the sweet soft notes of the Last Post, as it rang its pure
effective music into the hush of ^{the} afternoon. Another Newfoundlander
had given his all. Among his ^{late} last comrades in arms he sleeps, and
sleeping there merits that honour and thanks from all mankind, of
which, no man living can estimate the length or depth.

"If I should fall, grieve not that one so weak
And poor as I
Should die!
Nay, though thy heart should break,
Think only this: that when at dusk they speak
Of sons and brothers of another one
Then thou canst say: 'I too had a son;
He died for England's sake!'"

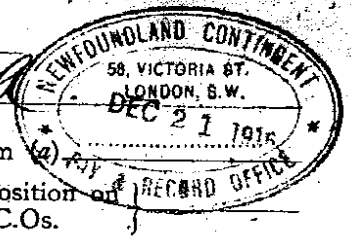
