On the 28th ultimo I wired the Record Office London at your request stating that your son No. 1481 White who was officially reported Missing had been reported, unofficially as being Killed in Action and requesting them to endeavour to obtain further information about him. I am today in receipt of a reply to the effect that there is no further report of your son beyond the fact that he is missing.

Dear Sir,

For some time past the Imperial Government have been making enquiries in relation to those men of the First Newfoundland Regiment who have been reported missing since the action of the 1st July. I very much regret to state, however, that from the correspondence which has taken place, a copy of which I enclose, it is evident that none of them are Prisoners of War in Germany, and the authorities are, therefore, reluctantly forced to the conclusion that all these gallant men, whose names are given in the enclosed list, and one of whom was very dear to you, were killed in that fateful action on the 1st of July.

I desire to express to you on behalf of the Government, as well as for myself, the sincerest sympathy in this time of sorrow. We feel the loss of our loved ones, but it will, no doubt, be some consolation to you to think that he, for whom you now mourn, willingly answered the call of King and Country, did his part nobly, and fell, facing the foe, in defence of the principles of Righteousness, Truth and Liberty. Though he has laid down the earthly weapons of warfare, he now wears the Soldier's Crown of Victory, and his name will be inscribed upon the Glorious Roll of Honor, and be held in fragrant memory by all his fellow-countrymen. When the victory is won, and Peace again reigns upon the earth, it will be a comforting thought to you that in this glorious achievement he bore no small part.

I trust that you may have the Grace and consolation of the Great Father of us all at this time.

I take the pleasure again of righting you a few lines to let you know I haven't forgotten you yet, all those you seem to have forgotten me, perhaps you haven't got my letter yet I send you, I like for you too let me now whether you forget me. Well Mary I now you are down-acted a bit but that will rub off buy and buy. I haven't forgotten you yet, and I won't forget you a while, because there is none like the girls at home. You know I told you more than once I would never leave you and I am going to stick to my promise as long as I live and if I come home from the war safe I will marry you and end all your troubles. I now I didn't ought to have come away and leave you in the state you was in. I see it now right plain. When you write Mary let me now how Daisy is getting on and Edie Well Mary who are left Stob's Camp now and where at Ayre in Scotland it's a seaport town, our other chaps is gone to the Dardenells where will be going in a couple of months time, like fore to be home to see you. I dreamed about you last night, I dreamt I was home and getting married to you. I expect that's what will happen if ever I get home it will be time then I am going to have you Mary and no body else, I told you that a good many times when you and me was courting. I haven't a had eighter letter from you this long spell, I suppose you have gone back on me, I hope not if you do - it will be your own fault and not mine I wish I was home to have a good cup of tea like we did last winter I miss them now. I should have been home now but my own foolish mind lead me a way. It's not all sunshine over here, half starved me of the times, it will be a glad day when we boys get home, but some mothers boy won't come home I hope it won't be my case

Well Mary I am going to send you the weding ring before October, and if I comes home I will settle all disputa. you now Mary I got some love for youal to I am far away from you.

 Mary you haught to bee proud you have a soldier boy away from home a fighting for is King and country-thears that are home sleeping in there on warm beads and I am sleeping on the land in the trenches nithing only they sky over me and the shot and shall are flying .you dont now when you goes to sleep at night when you hever will come alive again. Dont you worry there will bee lots of girels waiting fore the soldier boys when they comes back, but I spect there will bee a small few of us to somehome again, but if I never comes back again I wants for you all way to remember me .Tell Wilfred and Daisy I sends my best respects to them. I think I have toll you all for this time. now good bye and God bless you till I returns again to see you. now more at present from Fred to Mary. Good night

Dear Mary:

Just a few lines to you. I have got wone letter from you sence I leaved home, and that was the other day. I thought I would never hear from you again. Well Mary I havent much strage news to tell you only where still drilling away all the time. where ---fighting hearly every morning and wee goe right up through the town nearly every morning and wee goe bathing in the mornings, if I was home tonight I spose I would get a kiss I now i shant get wone ,not before I gets hom again and I spose I will get a scattered wone then. I now I made a great mistake. Mary to goe away

and leave you like you was. I shall always have it on my mind as long as I live. Mary I gets thinking a lot about it sometimes. You are the only wane I send to my fancy yet. I always loved you ever since the first night I went home with you and I shant be satisfied not before I gets you. you may think I am joking but I am not. I am sending my pitchers the next mail and some post cards.

I wish I could see you too night. I could tell you a good yard, but never mind I will see you some day if the Germans dont get me. I speak whee will be going about November and that will be the testing time of our lives. I now they will be many a sad heart but whee must hope for the best spose this the worst. I am going to see the end of it now, come life or death, sow you must keep up in good spirits tell I sees you again, and if I dont you will have to do the best you can. I should like to see Daisy now I speak she gave me a kiss. I think I have told you all the news fore this time, sow now more at present from Fred too Mary his true love. Good night and sleep tight XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX right as soon as you get this letter and I will do the same.
