Sir,-

I have the honour to report that No. 1995 Private J. McGrath, and No. 2065 Private P. Pender at present on the strength are unlikely to become efficient soldiers.

Private McGrath was attested November 22nd 1915, and Private Pender January 7th 1916. McGrath does not seem capable of learning the drill, and when detailed to go away with draft of "H" Company absented himself. Pender is continually drunk and has been arrested on several occasions, and in my opinion is a bad influence on the remainder of the Company.

I think further effort with these two men would be wasted and would ask for your authority to have them discharged.
